This week has provided us a positive start to the half term with the children engaging well with their learning opportunities and as a school we welcomed Ofsted in to conduct the school's first inspection since we opened. At this point, I am very happy to share that the inspectors observed the true heart of Marleigh Primary Academy and were impressed by how the school has developed such a strong offer to its pupils and families.

This half term, our key focus will be on finalising our **new curriculum information documents**. 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- Sports events (Tuesday 11th March Year 5/6 Matball, Tuesday 18th March Year 3/4 Active Learning, Tuesday 25th March - Year 3/4 Orienteering) - We have three sports events planned for this half term that will offer our KS2 children valuable opportunities to develop their skills and to collaborate and compete with children from other schools.
- Easter Celebrations (Last week of Spring term) We'll be spreading some festive cheer with Easter egg hunts, raffles, assemblies and lessons creating joyful memories for our children and strengthening their understanding of the meaning for some of this time of year.

News from our classrooms

Comets Class

We have been so proud of how well Comets Class have settled back into school this week. We have seen the children show **resilience** in their learning when **writing sentences**, and wonderful **collaboration skills** in their **independent learning**. Comets Class have shown so much kindness to each other this week that we have filled up our kindness bucket and have celebrated being **kindness superheroes**!



This week in **Literacy** we have been reading **What the Ladybird Heard** and have been creating and labelling different **maps**. The children in comets class have made treasure maps and maps of familiar places to them. Some children used chalk outside to create a large map of a farm, just like in the story we read. We have loved seeing them challenge themselves by adding labels and arrows to their maps.

With the weather being almost spring like this week Comets Class have spent lots of time outdoors. During busy learning time the children have enjoyed being imaginative in the **construction area** and have used the large resources to build their own police station (in case Hefty Hugh and Lanky Len from the story What the Ladybird Heard came to visit Comets Class!). The **mud kitchen** has also been popular this week. It has been lovely to hear the conversations between the children about what they are making, about the ingredients they need to use and to hear them working together. In **maths** this week we spent some time outside looking for things that were long and short. We then compared the things that we had found and sorted them into two different piles. The children were able to give fantastic explanations when talking about whether what they had found was long or short.



Inside this week we have been finding different way to practice weaving and threading, which has been a great way to develop our fine motor skills. This half term we will be creating our own bookmark and will have a go at sewing and so we have been practicing the skills of weaving and threading to get our fingers ready for this. We have been so impressed with how the children have preserved with this challenge and tried their best. Well done Comets Class.



Hercules Class

What a fabulous start to the new half term in Hercules Class - we've had a packed week already! The children have returned with great enthusiasm and have already begun diving into some exciting new topics across the curriculum.

In **English**, we have started exploring our new key text, **The Arrival by Shaun Tan**. This beautifully illustrated book, which tells the story of a man's journey to a strange new land, is sparking some brilliant discussions about migration, belonging, and storytelling without words. We can't wait to see how our descriptive writing develops from this thought-provoking book next week...

In **Science**, we are diving into the world of **electricity** and **circuits**. This half term, we will be investigating how circuits work, exploring conductors and insulators and even creating our own electrical projects. The children are already showing great curiosity and enthusiasm for this hands-on unit.

Meanwhile, in **Humanities**, our new Geography topic is all about **biomes** and **climate**, focusing particularly on desert life. As we explore different landscapes, climates, and the adaptations of people and animals, we will work towards answering our key enquiry question: *Would you like to live in the desert?*

It's been a brilliant first week back and we're looking forward to everything this half term has in store!

Vulcans Class

This week in English, we have been exploring some of **London's** most famous **landmarks**! We started by gathering interesting facts about Big Ben, the Houses of Parliament, Buckingham Palace, and the London Eye—*Did you know that Buckingham Palace has over 775 rooms?* We were all amazed.

In **Science**, we have been investigating **life cycles** and thinking about the different things we can do as we grow such as learning to walk, talk and read. We wondered: *Do our hands grow as we get older?* To find out, we measured the size of a baby's hand and an adult's hand. Then, we predicted the size of our own hands before drawing around them and measuring using cubes—what a fun way to learn! Finally, we wondered if the older you are the bigger your hands are. We found out this wasn't true as some of the members in our class have bigger hands than Mrs McLachlan!

In **PSHE**, we have been learning how to **cross the road safely**. We discovered different types of crossings (*Do you know what a Pegasus Crossing is?*) and then put our knowledge to the test outside. Some of us were pedestrians, some were cars, and some even became the traffic lights! It was a great way to practice staying safe when out and about. Well done, Year 2, for another fantastic week of learning!



As a school family, we are very excited for her and we know you will want to join us in wishing her well on this adventure with her family.






Upcoming events and reminders
