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Headteacher's insight

One of our key priorities in school is helping children to secure their core knowledge – particularly in reading, number facts and times tables. We know that children learn best when key facts are rehearsed regularly in small, manageable chunks. This kind of repetition builds confidence, fluency and long-term understanding.

This is where learning at home plays such an important role. Home learning does not need to be formal or time-consuming to be effective. Simple, everyday moments can make a real difference. Reading road signs as you travel together, spotting number bonds on door numbers while out for a walk, or answering a times table question for each step as your child walks up the stairs to bed are all powerful ways to reinforce learning in a natural, low-pressure way.

Regular reading at home is especially important. Reading to your child, listening to them read, and talking about books together all help to develop strong reading habits. Recording this reading in your child's reading record allows us to celebrate progress and support them effectively in school. Children also benefit greatly from seeing adults read for pleasure; modelling reading at home sends a powerful message that reading matters.

We have also been delighted to see the creativity sparked by our menu of learning tasks. The range of responses and individual styles has been wonderful to celebrate. These tasks provide valuable opportunities for discussion at home about what children are learning in school, and they often lead to learning being deepened even further. Most importantly, they show children that their learning is valued beyond the classroom.

By practising little and often, and by talking positively about learning at home, children begin to see learning as part of everyday life rather than something that only happens in school. Thank you for the many ways you continue to support your child – your involvement makes a lasting impact and we can see the benefits to your children in the classroom.



Movement Miles Update

Congratulations to all the Students who took part in the 2-week Anglian Learning Movement Miles Competition! Pupils and staff got moving by running, walking, cycling and swimming and more before, during and after school and at the weekends — and the results were AMAZING.



Together, Marleigh travelled 241.91 miles!

That's roughly the distance from Cambridge to London and back again — what a journey!

After 241 submissions across all schools, the average wellbeing score was 4.5/5

A brilliant reminder that moving more isn't just great for your body — it's amazing for your mind too.

Together, Marleigh, Fen Ditton, Stapleford and Bottisham Primary Schools travelled a massive 1,634.914 miles!

That's the same as going from London to Rome and back again... with miles to spare, it's also the equivalent of running over 62 marathons

Huge congratulations to everyone who took part — you've shown that teamwork, determination, and movement can achieve big things!



Caterpillars Class



Caterpillars have been exploring our topics of **Winter** and **animals**. We continue to enjoy Welly Wednesday in the forest. This week we based our learning on the story **Hamilton's Hats** and followed a trail of hats through the wood. The children tried on the hats and talked about who they might belong to.

Caterpillars continue to develop other skills such as motor skills by riding the trikes and exploring the role play vets area which complements their learning about domestic animals and pet care.

We have had fun at the maths table this week thinking about 1,2 and 3 including how we can recognise quantities, numeral recognition and numbers in rhymes and stories.

Ladybirds Class

This week in **maths**, we have been adding within 20, exploring different ways to add numbers and using our number bond knowledge to help us work things out more quickly and confidently.

In **English**, we have continued writing our non-fiction texts about the Great Fire of London, learning about what happened after the fire and how the city began to rebuild. The children have worked hard to include facts and organise their ideas clearly.

In **science**, we have been exploring our senses, focusing on taste and smell. The children particularly enjoyed investigating different flavours and scents — although 90% dark chocolate was definitely not the treat many were expecting! We also discovered that smells can be pleasant to some people but unpleasant to others, leading to some great discussions about how our senses can work differently.

In **art**, we have been learning about mixing colours to create new shades, before using LEGO bricks to print patterns with paint. The children loved experimenting with colour combinations and the printing process — it was a very exciting and creative session!

Please don't forget our trip on Tuesday and make sure that the children come to school dressed for the weather. We are looking forward to it!





Badgers Class

Badgers have had a very busy and enjoyable week, full of exciting learning across the curriculum. In **science**, we have been learning all about the phases of the moon. To help us understand this tricky concept, we used Oreos to represent the different phases, carefully modelling how the moon changes shape throughout the lunar cycle. This hands-on activity really helped to bring our learning to life and was thoroughly enjoyed by the class.

In **history**, we stepped back in time to **Tudor England** and focused on **Queen Elizabeth I** and her famous visit to Worcester. We explored why royal visits were so important and learned how people in Tudor times prepared for such an event. The children were fascinated to discover the amount of planning involved, from cleaning streets to decorating the city, and enjoyed comparing life in Tudor times with life today.


In **RE**, we continued our learning about different religious head coverings. This week, we focused on the kippah in Judaism, learning about when and why it is worn and what it symbolises. The children showed great respect and curiosity during discussions and asked thoughtful questions about different beliefs and traditions.

In **PE**, Badgers have been working hard on their gymnastics skills. Mr Parker has been extremely impressed with the class's determination, resilience and positive attitudes. The children have shown great teamwork and perseverance while practising and improving their routines, and their confidence continues to grow each week.
